Telling Tales

Do you like to hear stories? Then Jonesboro, Tennessee, is the place for you. That's where the National Storytelling Festival has been held each year since 1973. The festival's founders wanted people to enjoy the art of storytelling. Today, more than 10,000 visitors laugh and cry as they listen to **insightful** storytellers.

Why is storytelling so popular? Stories tell us about our past—and maybe about our future. “Long ago, when there were no books or TV,

it was the storyteller's job to explain why there are stars in the sky, why we laugh and cry,” says California storyteller Brenda Wong Aoki.

“Everyone can be a good storyteller. That's what we do every day,” says Syd Lieberman, a storyteller from Chicago. One **technique** for telling stories is to describe your everyday life. Says Lieberman, “When you say, ‘Mom, listen to what happened today,’ that's the beginning of a story.”

Tales of the Trickster

How do storytellers explain the world we live in?

Where does the wind come from? Why is there night? Why does a leopard have spots?

Nowadays, scientists **investigate** and answer questions like these. But long ago, people made up stories to explain how the world works. Some of these stories were trickster tales.

Meet the Trickster

A trickster is a character in a story. Tricksters use their wits to get what they want. Sometimes they trick other characters. Sometimes they are the ones being tricked. A trickster doesn't always have the same name or even the same body. He is often an animal with human features, such as a coyote, fox, tortoise, or spider.

The Trickster Animals

Like an actor playing different parts in different movies, the trickster has many roles. For example, the trickster character varies in Native American stories. He can be a **cunning** coyote in a story from the Crow nation. He may be a brave raven in a story from the Pacific Northwest. Or the trickster may be a spider dressed in deerskin clothes in a Dakota Territory tale.

The Way Things Work

Native American trickster tales were spoken, not written. They were passed down from one storyteller to the next. However, each person puts his or her own stamp on the story.

Oral stories are different from written stories. Written stories stay the same on a page. They may pass from generation to generation this way. Spoken stories are different because they can change over time. A storyteller doesn't always memorize a tale word for word. The storyteller might remember important parts at the beginning, middle, and end. As a result, no two stories are ever told exactly the same.

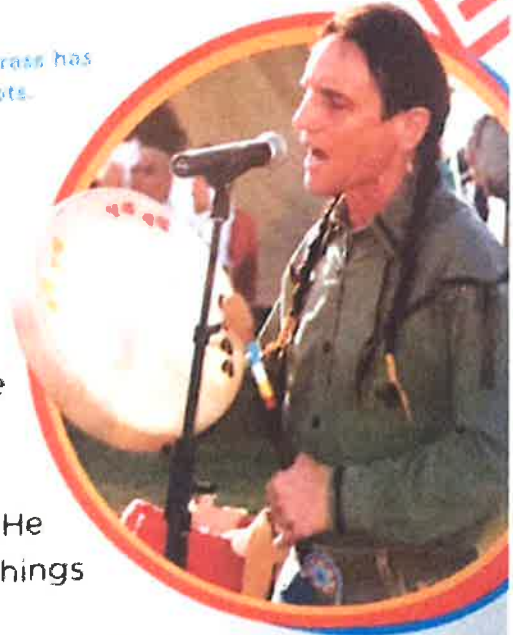
Native American Storytellers

Robert Greygrass is a Native American storyteller who was born in California. He has appeared in many storytelling events, such as the Bay Area Storytelling Festival in El Sobrante, California. "He was great," said 10-year-old Patrick Whamond. "He told stories about animals and how things got to be the way they are."

Like other storytellers, Greygrass uses **insightful** tales to teach, inspire, and entertain. He tells many stories about the history of Native Americans. Some of his tales also describe mankind's place in the universe.

Another Native American storyteller is Rose Red Elk, or Red Feather Woman. She was born on a reservation in Poplar, Montana. When Rose was a child, her father and grandfather told her stories about her ancestors. Now a successful storyteller herself, she says, "Stories were used as teaching tools, lessons to learn in life, and history of the people."

The **majority** of Rose's tales are from Sioux and Assiniboine tribes. Unlike some other storytellers, Rose sets her words to music. She uses this **technique** to make her stories even more entertaining.



Worldwide Tricksters

It isn't only Native Americans who tell trickster tales. Many countries have their own trickster stories. Korea's trickster shows up in "The Ungrateful Tiger," and children in India hear about "The Fish That Were Too Clever."

The trickster has a strong place in American folk traditions. Riccardo Salmona, who worked at the American Folk Art Museum in New York City says, "Trickster stories can pass along jokes, relay instructions on honoring the dead, preserve figures of speech—many things." Salmona adds, "They have become part of the fabric of our communities."

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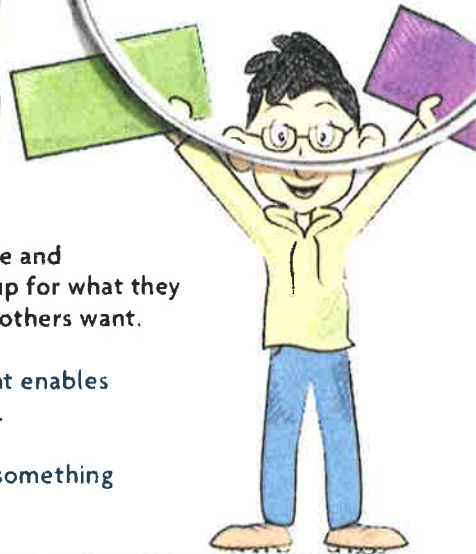

Voices of the Past

At the end of the United States Civil War, about four million enslaved Africans were freed. Between 1932 and 1975, some recorded their stories. Twenty-three of these stories are now available for us to hear.

The recordings appear on the Library of Congress Web site. Here you can find storytellers who talk about their experiences. Many speak about the work they did, their families, and how they felt. Others tell about their later lives as free men and women.

Isom Moseley was a boy when he was freed. He remembers that things were slow to change. "It was a year before the folks knewed they was free," he says.

Michael Taft is the head of the library's archive of folk culture. He says the recordings let us know things that written stories can't. "It's how something is said that helps tell the story," Taft says.



SHARPEN THE SAW

Habit 7: SHARPEN THE SAW encourages you to find balance. Just as a car cannot operate well if its four wheels are out of balance, you cannot operate well if your four parts (**BODY**, **BRAIN**, **HEART**, and **SOUL**) are out of balance.

HEART Collect jokes, spend time with family and friends, play with a younger sibling (or at least be nice).

SOUL Reflect on your mission statement, help someone, listen to music, make a meaningful contribution.
