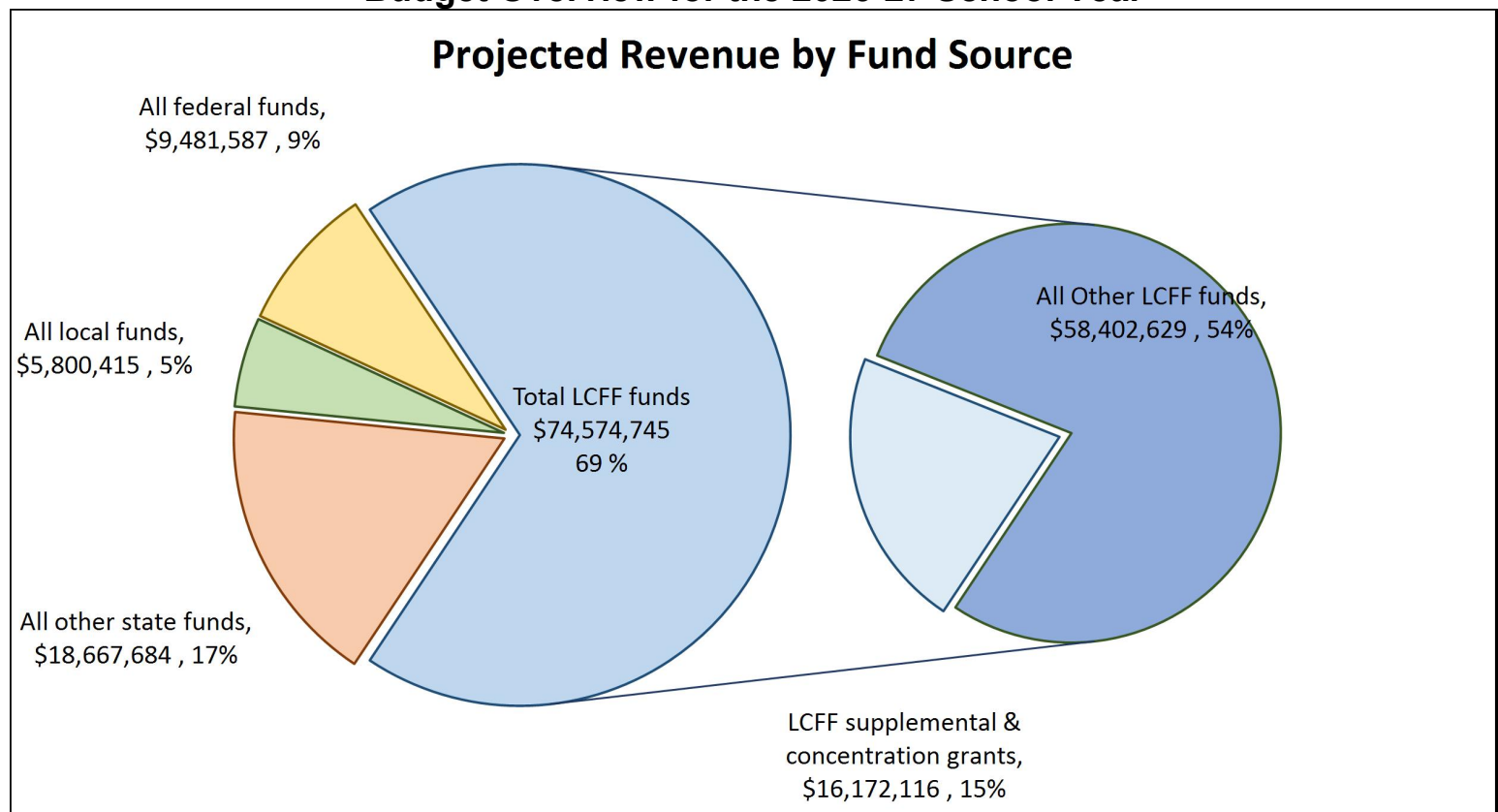

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School districts receive funding from different sources: state funds under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), other state funds, local funds, and federal funds. LCFF funds include a base level of funding for all LEAs and extra funding - called "supplemental and concentration" grants - to LEAs based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learners, and low-income students).

Budget Overview for the 2026-27 School Year

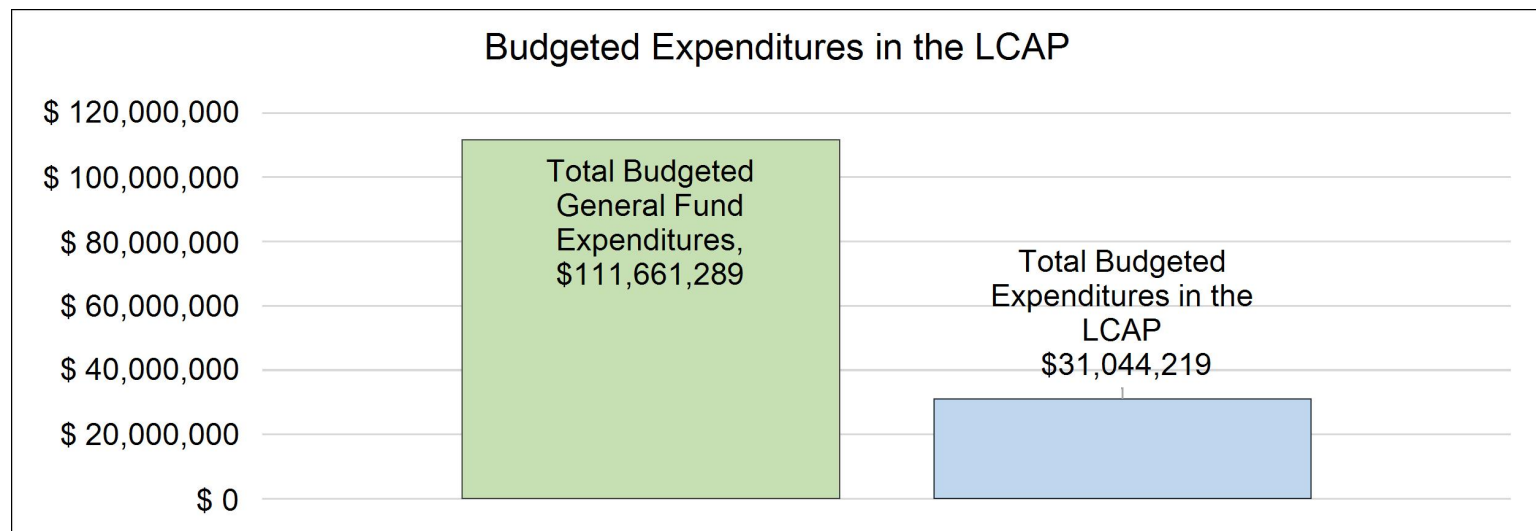


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Fallbrook Union Elementary School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Fallbrook Union Elementary School District is \$108,524,431, of which \$74,574,745. is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$18,667,684 is other state funds, \$5,800,415 is local funds, and \$9,481,587 is federal funds. Of the \$74,574,745. in LCFF Funds, \$16,172,116 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

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The LCFF gives school districts more flexibility in deciding how to use state funds. In exchange, school districts must work with parents, educators, students, and the community to develop a Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) that shows how they will use these funds to serve students.



This chart provides a quick summary of how much Fallbrook Union Elementary School District plans to spend for 2026-27. It shows how much of the total is tied to planned actions and services in the LCAP.

The text description of the above chart is as follows: Fallbrook Union Elementary School District plans to spend \$111,661,289 for the 2026-27 school year. Of that amount, \$31,044,219 is tied to actions/services in the LCAP and \$80,617,070 is not included in the LCAP. The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP will be used for the following:

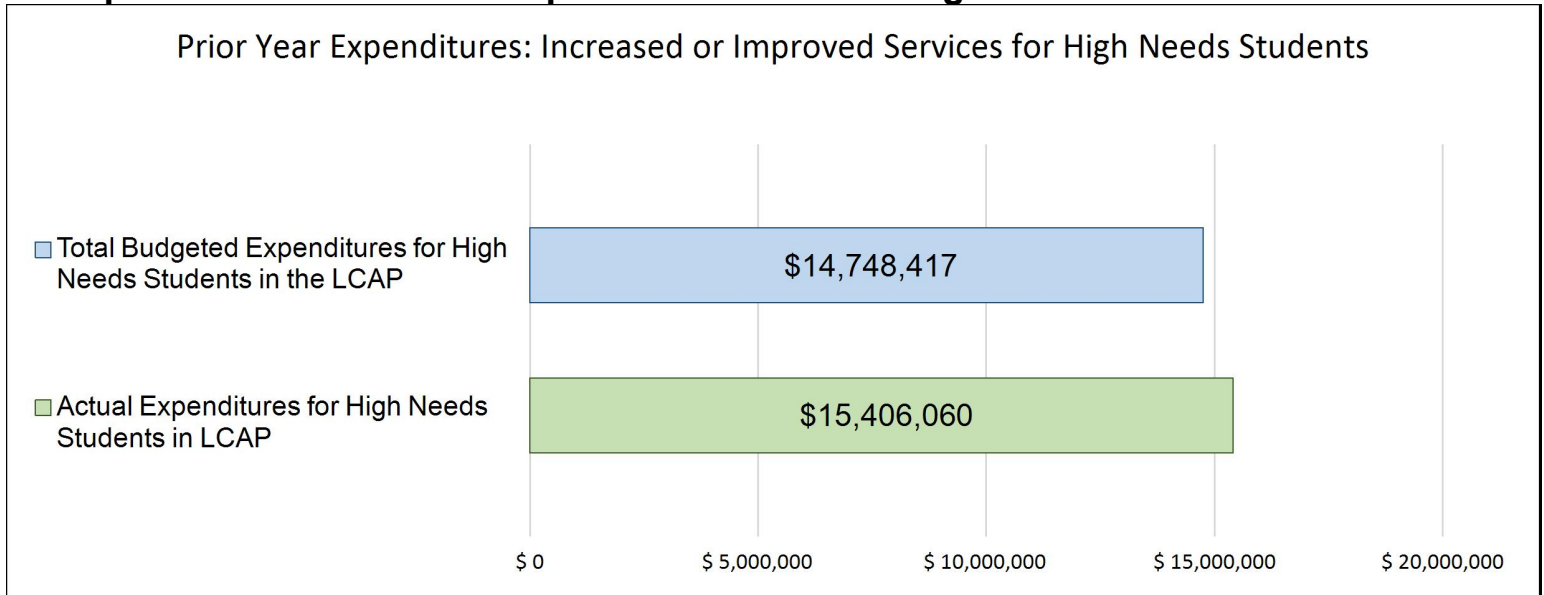
Fallbrook Union Elementary School District plans to spend \$111,661,289 for the 2026-27 school year. Of that amount, \$31,044,219 is tied to actions/services in the LCAP and \$80,617,070 is not included in the LCAP. The budgeted expenditures that are not included in the LCAP include school staff not identified in the LCAP, District Office support staff, Transportation, Routine Restricted Maintenance requirements, Special Education and other General Fund operational expenses.

Increased or Improved Services for High Needs Students in the LCAP for the 2026-27 School Year

In 2026-27, Fallbrook Union Elementary School District is projecting it will receive \$16,172,116 based on the enrollment of Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students. Fallbrook Union Elementary School District must describe how it intends to increase or improve services for high needs students in the LCAP. Fallbrook Union Elementary School District actually spent \$15,406,060 for actions to increase or improve services for high needs students in 2025-26.
